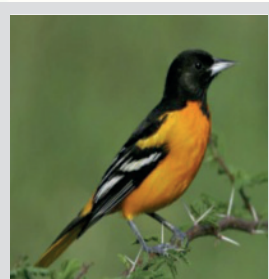

## The President's Corner



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Hello Anneslie,

I hope this newsletter arrived on your doorstep and didn't get stolen by thieves. Unfortunately, many of our neighbor's packages or other delivery items have been stolen from their porches. What can we do to stop this problem? Here are a couple suggestions: 1. knowing that many of you can't be home all day, have the package delivered to your work or a trusted neighbor; or 2. identify a local business who will accept your delivery (I recall reading something about this on Facebook). Please share your ideas with the community any way you can so that we can try to solve this problem. Here are some other thoughts: 1. perform daytime COP patrols to let the thieves know we're watching; 2. watch for deliveries to your neighbor's house then offer to bring the package to your own house; or 3. report suspicious cars to the police. One last idea: buy locally.

The community continues to have solicitors coming to our doors at all hours of the evening. As the summer and good weather approaches, I'm sure they'll be back in full force. I did some research and learned about the laws related to hucksters and peddlers. Please see my article on Page 7 for the details.

Our neighbors on Windwood Road have been experiencing parking problems for several years. Drumcastle Center has had more employees than parking spaces. The County has a parking agreement with

Kingdom Worship Center to use weekday spaces. The Board has been able to push the County into a long-term solution. Parking spaces were added at St. Pius X and assigned to specific employees, other employees have been moved out of the building, and the existing garage is being replaced in the same location with a higher capacity garage. That's a big win for everyone as the County had considered building the garage on the KWC property, right in our community! Windwood residents, thanks for your patience as the new garage gets built and let's all hope the parking problems will disappear.

The ACA Board organized several events over the past couple of months. Board members and block captains welcomed new neighbors to the community in March. Thanks VP McGovern and family for hosting the New Neighbor Party. More recently, many neighbors joined together at the annual Bowling Night at Stoneleigh Lanes, the Spring Yard Sale, and Dumpster Day. I hope you were able to participate in these fun events. ## Citizens on Patrol

Would you like to make a difference in your community? Volunteer for the Anneslie Citizens On Patrol! The Anneslie COP is a great way to get involved with a worthwhile community initiative having a very minimal time commitment! We work closely the Towson Precinct of the Baltimore County Police and with the COP programs of our neighboring communities.

Volunteers with Anneslie's C O P Program patrol the streets of our neighborhood. Their job is to report

suspicious activity and help local law enforcement officers keep our neighborhood safe. Volunteers are asked to participate in one 1.5 hour shift approximately every 7 weeks, although you may certainly do more if you desire. Shifts take place on Friday and Saturday nights, with an early and a late shift. The early shift is from 9:30 - 11 PM and the late shift runs from 11 PM - 12:30 AM. You can request the shift you prefer! If you prefer daytime shifts, or shifts during the week, let us know!

You can volunteer with your spouse or another neighbor/friend. What a nice way to help the community and spend some time together. As if a new grandchild wasn't enough, Amy and Jim then became parents to their new rescue dog, Jackson. He is adorable too!

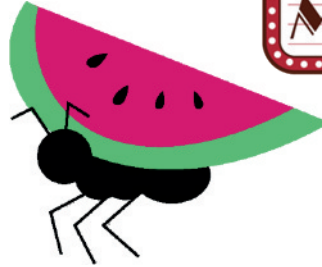

# *Anneslie Sign Update*

As many of you have noticed, the property on York Road that has been home to our new community sign has been put up for sale. Shortly after Mr. Cathell granted us permission to erect the sign there in late 2014, he passed away. The property was put on the market late last year by his son, so we were concerned that any new owner may not extend the use of the location. Although we had intended to work with Mr. Cathell to create an easement around the sign that would potentially make the location more permanent, that did not happen.

Fortunately, the property was recently purchased by Mr. Jim Craig, a local insurance broker, who intends to relocate one of his local Allstate offices to the building. A Rodgers Forge resident, Jim recently met with the Board to express his desire not only reach to out to the community that will now become home for his office, but to ensure us that the sign may remain. He has begun some improvements to the property and has worked with the marketing team at Allstate to find ways to provide signage for his business without having to move or alter the sign. We have also been given permission to create a landscaped bed around the base of the sign and perhaps even add some lighting to improve nighttime visibility.

We wish to thank Jim and hope that the community will also thank and support him, when he opens for business in the coming months.

## *Door-to-Door Solicitation Law*

In April 2015, the Baltimore County Council passed Bill No. 38-15 which changed the law pertaining to door-to-door solicitors, also known as hucksters or peddlers. Here are the basics gleaned from the bill for you to know:

- The law does not apply to farmers or growers selling their own vegetables or other perishable farm products or school-age children who are engaged in fund-raising activities.
- A huckster may not offer any services or item of merchandise for sale to the occupant:
  - if a “no soliciting” sign or similar is visibly displayed
  - before 9:00 a.m.
  - after 7:00 p.m or sunset, whichever is earlier
- The huckster must be licensed. However, the law does not specifically state that he/she must display or carry the license.

# Green News

## *Stormwater Solutions for Anneslie – What can you do?*

A lot of attention has been given to increased flooding in our neighborhood in recent years. As Towson continues to grow, increased impervious surfaces are having a big impact downstream.

There are things we can do in our neighborhood to help alleviate the situation and Blue Water Baltimore is a great resource for help. Here are some suggestions for your property:

1. If your downspout is connected to an underground pipe that discharges into the street, consider disconnecting it and allowing the stormwater to be absorbed in your yard. The rainwater can now irrigate your lawn and garden. Also, the water is filtered by your lawn and garden removing pollution.

2. Plant a tree in your yard. Trees retain vast quantities of storm water on their leaves and bark – 100 gallons or more for a mature tree, allowing some water to evaporate and the rest to reach the ground more slowly. The roots of the tree absorb even more water keeping it from entering the stormwater sewers.

3. Install conservation landscaping or a rain garden in your yard. These plantings slow and absorb storm water so that it never makes it to the storm sewer.

4. Reduce and remove impervious surfaces. Redo your driveway with pavers that allow water to be absorbed between the joints. Replace your concrete patio with a raised deck. Turn your concrete sidewalk into stepping-stones.

5. Install a rain barrel to store water runoff from your roof and use it to water your plants.

6. Install a green roof. 15-90% of rooftop runoff can be absorbed with plants installed over special membranes on your roof.

Some services are free and some are subsidized to help reduce stormwater runoff. Everyone can play a part in reducing flooding in our neighborhood and improving water quality.

## *Neighbors Participate in Stream Clean-Up*

We had a wildly successful day of cleaning up the stream in Stoneleigh Woods April 24 from 1-4pm.

The stream clean-up was a joint effort between the Alliance for the Chesapeake Bay which organizes Project Clean stream throughout Delaware, Maryland, Pennsylvania and Virginia, Blue Water Baltimore which organizes stream clean-ups in the Baltimore area and the Green Towson Alliance, who organized 8 clean-ups in the Towson area this spring along the Herring Run or its tributaries. Sarah Van Tiem and Beth Miller are both residents of Anneslie who have known each other since our oldest children attended Stoneleigh Elementary School together. We decided to team-up to be co-captains for the stream clean-up since we have both been active in encouraging greening efforts in our neighborhood.



Ironically, Delegate Stephen Lafferty wanted to attend, but was unable to as he was hosting an event to thank volunteers for their service that afternoon.

The organizers were amazed at the amount of trash removed. Ms. Sue Thompson, first grade teacher at Stoneleigh Elementary School, runs the Stoneleigh Green Club from the school. She reported that her club regularly cleans up trash in the area - a total to date this year of 40 bags of trash, 2 grocery carts and large PCV piping! This club has been participating in a Green Clean-up competition that Baltimore County has been sponsoring. In addition, Sarah met a nearby resident who regularly walks his dog along the stream and takes a bag to pick up trash. With all this attention, we were actually slightly concerned there might not be enough trash for our volunteers to pick-up. Sarah and Beth walked the stream twice before the clean-up and didn't see a lot of garbage other than some big items, so we also planned to spend time removing invasive plants. The area is covered in English ivy, barberry and garlic mustard - all invasive species that choke out native plants that help to stabilize the stream banks.

As it turned out, there was plenty of work on both fronts. Trash thrown along Towson area streets washes into storm drains and ends up in our waterways with distressing regularity. Here is a tally of what was removed during our clean-up:

- 8 bags of invasive plants
- 10 bags of garbage

- 2 bags of bottles & cans
- a very heavy, wet and soggy carpet (cut into pieces, wrapped around a shovel handle and carted out by two strong men)
- a tennis fence
- a motorized scooter
- and other sundry treasures.

Sarah identified a couple of struggling native plants - trillium and May apples around which she removed the pervasive English ivy to give them a fighting chance!

Refreshments were provided by the Country Club of Maryland. The Herring Run passes through the golf course, and the Country Club was supportive of our volunteer efforts.

This stream clean-up presented a particular challenge because Kimway Road, where Baltimore County picked it up the next day, is separated from the stream by a long hill. The organizers brought a wheelbarrow and a red flyer wagon to help with this task.

Our volunteers were all very hard working and ranged in age from first grade to "mature."

# Uncle Wiggly's

Uncle Wiggly's went under new ownership last summer. As of February, the local ice cream shop and deli also is under a new ceiling. And it has new walls, a new floor, new equipment, and new offerings.

Eden Lopez and his wife Abby Le purchased Uncle Wiggly's, which has been on the edge of our neighborhood at 6911 York Road since 1995, in late July. Eden has been in the food business for almost seventeen years, but this is his debut as a shop owner. He likes that he gets to make his own hours, although that means he is there every day to keep "on top of it."

Uncle Wiggly's offers Taharka Brothers ice cream,



vegetarian and children's options, and salads, as well as burgers and corned beef brisket.

Uncle Wiggly's delivers in our neighborhood, on weekdays from 11 to 2, with a minimum purchase of \$15. The shop is open from 10 a.m. to 9:30 p.m., with extended hours in the summer.

which is locally made in Baltimore, as well as Edy's and Turkey Hill. Eden likes to "stay in touch with three vendors" to ensure that flavors are available. Uncle Wiggly's offers more than fifty flavors. The most popular flavors for adults are honey graham and key lime pie (which combine together well, by the way). Children tend to order birthday cake or bubble gum. Eden himself prefers classics like mint chocolate chip and cookies 'n cream. In addition to cones, customers can purchase pints and quarts.

Sandwiches came to Uncle Wiggly's in about 2000, and the options didn't really change until Eden came along. He loves "creating sandwiches, making them, and making sure customers are happy." He uses Dietz and Watson meats and offers wraps, specialty sandwiches like the Raven (roast beef, onions, roasted red peppers and tomato horseradish mayo on a brioche roll) and the Porkalypse (slow cooked pulled pork, bacon, cheddar and coleslaw on a brioche roll),

Among other things, the website has information regarding:

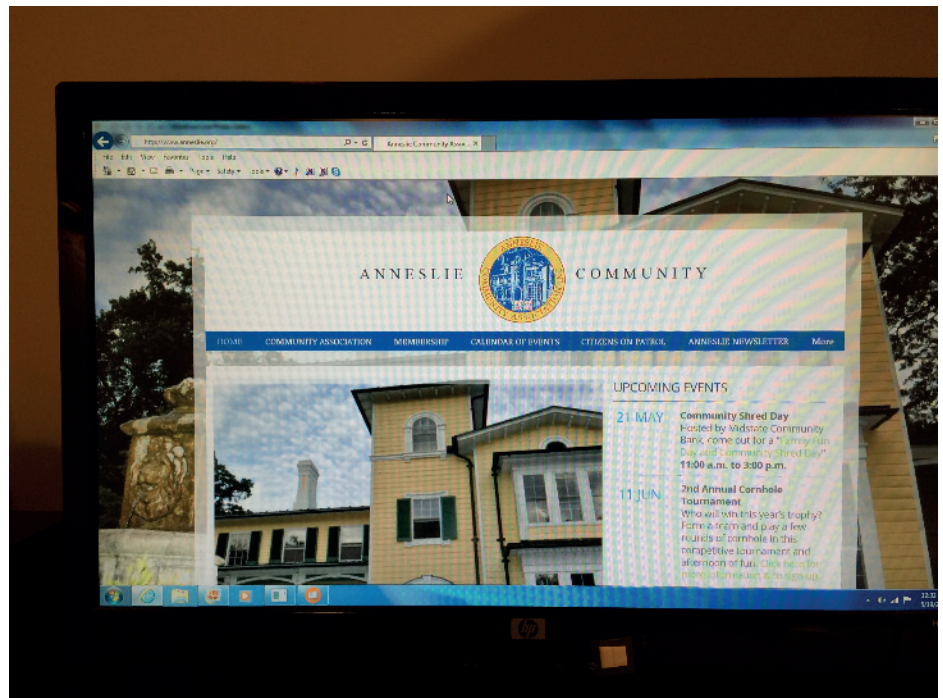
