The President's Corner



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Hello Anneslie,

The summer is coming to an end and the kids, young and old, are heading back to school. Many mornings and afternoons will soon be filled with children walking on our sidewalks and crossing our streets. Fall also brings the kids out into their yards for a late afternoon game with friends (after homework is done of course). Please keep your eyes open and be cautious of kids running across the street without thinking to look both ways.

Parked cars on our community streets have become a bit of a concern for many including the Baltimore County Police. In the past, the police have ticketed vehicles that are parked along the curb facing the wrong direction. BCPD indicated that passenger tires must be within 12 inches of the curb. Also, any vehicle parked on the street that is not registered is considered abandoned and subject to code enforcement. If you have an unused vehicle on the street, please move it.

I am happy to note that Baltimore County has begun work to replace and expand the parking garage behind Drumcastle Center. The garage, when complete, and the existing surface lot are expected to provide enough parking spaces for employees and visitors to the building. I have requested further information on the garage related to size, footprint and lighting and will share it

with the neighboring homeowners when I receive it.

Drainage problems persist with many of our streets and yards. This is primarily because many of the corrugated or terra cotta pipes installed by the developer back in the 1920s are failing or are undersized. Unfortunately, the County takes no responsibility for any pipes outside the roadway right-of-way, including those that connect the street inlets. If you have a failing pipe or a related drainage problem, please contact the Baltimore County Department of Public Works to file a complaint. The County is aware of our problems and has prepared a drainage report evaluating a portion of a system starting in Stoneleigh crossing into Anneslie. The Association is reviewing this report and will provide comments back to BCDPW. More on this to come later.

ACA events are continuing into the Fall and Winter, including the Picnic, Halloween Parade, Annual Meeting, and Santa's visit. ACA members are welcome to attend any event. More information about these events are included inside this newsletter and on the community website. The website is also the place to go to pay your annual dues for 2016. 
In Memoriam

Gilbert (Gil) Munk: September 2, 1949 – July 19, 2016

Gil died at the age of 66 after a three-year struggle with multiple myeloma, a cancer of the blood. In Gil's own words, he was a "born, bred, and buttered Baltimore Boy" and lived virtually his whole life in and around Baltimore. He loved just about everything about Baltimore – its neighborhoods, beer, museums, music, quirkiness, and, of course, "dem O's."

Gil grew up in the 1950's and 1960's in Armistead Gardens, a working class neighborhood on the east side of Baltimore. Growing up in Armistead Gardens shaped Gil's attitude about the vital role that neighborhoods play in creating a strong sense of community. And, we who live in Anneslie with Gil and his wife, Bee, have been the

beneficiaries of that love of neighborhood.



After high school graduation, Gil attended Towson State College for a while before joining an ashram in Baltimore, learning yoga, practicing meditation, and subsequently teaching yoga. This experience shaped Gil's way of looking at the world and beyond. Gil was a very spiritual person without being a religious person in a formal or traditional way. A quote from the Dalai Lama particularly resonated with Gil. "What is my religion? Be kind whenever possible. It is always possible. " And Gil was very kind and generous.

Gil worked a variety of different jobs as a young man. What characterized Gil was that he was a problem solver and loved learning how things worked and what made them tick. He loved computers at a time when computers were not very user friendly. He completed a program in computer engineering at RETS Electronic Institute and became an information technology engineer. In a variety of work settings including periods of self-employment, Gil helped businesses and individuals to solve computer problems and maintain and improve their information systems. In a rapidly changing field, Gil was constantly learning about computers, in particular, and technology, in general, and thinking about what changes were over the horizon that he needed to address.

As a young man, Gil became a serious contra dancer and swing dancer. He was very committed to dancing and was very, very good. Good enough

that he became a swing dance instructor. But the greatest value of dancing was that it enabled him to meet and court Bee. They married on May 21, 1988, moved to Anneslie in 1989 and had their first son, James, on October 17, 1990. Son Sam came along on August 31, 1993.

As diverse as Gil was in his life interests and roles, being a father and husband were the two roles that were most important to him. Gil embraced fatherhood with a focus, energy, and commitment that lasted throughout his life. He loved his boys, Sam and James, and was involved in their pursuits and interests in art, photography, sports, scouting, and gaming, etc.

Gil also loved the Towson community, the Anneslie neighborhood, and his neighbors. Over the years, Gil served in many different roles from baseball coach to TRC sport commissioner to the Anneslie webmaster to the neighborhood's Citizens on Patrol. Being a good neighbor was not a platitude to Gil; it was a value he incorporated into his daily life and way of interacting with people.

Gil described himself as a "free thinker." Gil always had an independent view and sometimes took unexpected or contrarian positions on issues of the day. One thing that could be counted on was that Gil, the kid from Armistead Gardens, was always on the side of the common person. And the other thing that could be counted on is that Gil would be politically engaged in the issues that mattered to him. Barely a month before Gil died, he wrote to Representative Dutch Ruppersberger thanking the Congressman for not accepting any money from the National Rifle Association.

Husband, father, friend, computer expert, dancer, activist, neighbor, good citizen, lover of music, sports fan, and connoisseur is still an incomplete list of the life roles for the "born, bred, and buttered Baltimore Boy." Gil was a self-described "lover of mysteries, physical and metaphysical" and lived his life with a powerful curiosity and desire to find the Truth. Gil's example inspires us, his neighbors and friends. We will miss him sorely.



Green News

Everything trees!

Ensuring that our wonderful tree canopy in Anneslie will continue for generations to come requires planting, maintaining and preserving trees. Read on to learn how you can help and how you benefit from trees in Anneslie.

Plant a tree this fall!

For the seventh year in a row, we are partnering with Blue Water Baltimore (BWB) to make low cost canopy shade trees available to Anneslie residents. Planting a tree now is an investment in the canopy of the future as our mature trees reach the end of their life.

Most trees in Anneslie must be planted in yards due to Baltimore County policy that prevents BWB from planting in the green space between sidewalk and curb unless it is six feet or wider. For \$75 you will get a tree planted with mulch, stakes and a watering bag. Tree will be planted in November.

Go to the Blue Water Baltimore website to sign up for a tree to be planted this fall at http://www.bluewaterbaltimore.org/take-action/street-yard-tree-order-form/. BWB and/or I will follow up to confirm location and species. Tree species available include the following:

- Bald cypress
- River birch
- Black gum
- Sassafras
- Swamp White Oak
- Willow Oak
- Northern Red Oak
- American Elm DED resistant cultivars
- White Pine
- Hackberry

Prune a tree this winter!

Part of the work of maintaining our neighborhood's tree canopy is to prune trees along the street so they are not damaged by trucks, do not become a nuisance to pedestrians on the sidewalk and to encourage healthy branch structure as they grow. After years of neglect, volunteers pruned street trees on Murdock and Anneslie Roads last winter. This winter we hope to prune trees on Dunkirk, Overbrook and Windwood! Preserve your trees!

How your trees brings value to you and your community

Is the shade tree in your yard or by the street worth any money? Its worth can be measured in many ways.

Worth money to your family:

- Your shade tree can save up to 56% of summer air-conditioning costs.
- An evergreen tree can save up to 3% of winter heating costs.
- Large specimen trees can increase property value by 10%.
- Each large tree in front can add 1% to house sale price.

Worth money to your family and your neighbors' families: Your tree improves our air quality by

- absorbing pollutants through its leaves (ozone, nitrogen dioxide, sulfur dioxide),
- intercepting particles (dust, ash, smoke), releasing oxygen,
- lowering air temperatures (which decreases ozone production), and
- reducing emissions by power plants by decreasing energy needs.

How much is saved by avoiding asthma attacks, headaches, lung and heart diseases, and cancers due to air pollution?

Your tree helps keep your basement dry, and those of neighbors downhill, and helps decrease those huge pools at our intersections by

- intercepting and holding rain water on leaves and bark to evaporate, and
- taking up water through the roots, and transpiring it back into the air.

Try this TREE BENEFIT CALCULATOR to see how much economic and environmental value your tree contributes, and how much might be lost if you take down a tree: http://www.treebenefits.com/calculator/. For example, using the Tree Benefit Calculator, a 17 year old Willow Oak whose trunk, measured at 4½ feet from the ground, is 53½ inches around has a diameter of 17 inches

 $(C = \pi d)$. The Tree Benefit Calculator says it saves \$137 per year, and as it grows it will save more!

- 114 kilowatt hours of cooling this summer
- 4 therms of natural gas for heating next winter
- Increases property value by about \$76 this year
- Helps keep the basement dry, and those of neighbors downhill; it takes up 3,837 gallons of stormwater this year alone.
- For the neighborhood, it cools the air, and captures air pollutants and decreases their production, contributing to our health.

These financial and other empirical benefits pale beside the social and emotional benefits of the trees that make Anneslie such a special home for us all.

Would you like to make a difference in your community? Volunteer for the Anneslie Citizens On Patrol!

The Anneslie COP is a great way to get involved with a worthwhile community initiative having a very minimal time commitment! We work closely the Towson Precinct of the Baltimore County Police and with the COP programs of our neighboring communities.

Volunteers with Anneslie's COP Program patrol the streets of our neighborhood. Their job is to report suspicious activity and help local law enforcement officers keep our neighborhood safe. Volunteers are asked to participate in one 1.5 hour shift approximately every 7 weeks, although you may certainly do more if you desire. Shifts take place on Friday and Saturday nights, with an early and a late shift. The early shift is from 9:30 - 11 PM and the late shift runs from 11 PM - 12:30 AM. You can request the shift you prefer! If you prefer daytime shifts, or shifts during the week, let us know!


